Student Attendance Matters

Addressing attendance is part of our new School Improvement Plan. The department has given each school a system target to improve attendance rate. 95% and above is our expected student attendance.


Student attendance is recorded daily and all non-attendance require parents and carers to provide an explanation for the absence. Please let the office staff know if your child is absent or will be away.

Attendance: everyday counts is a theme that we are focusing on. Our school will be identifying and understanding attendance patterns and embedding proactive strategies to address students' needs

Research highlights a clear correlation between student attendance and the achievement of quality academic, socio-economic and health outcomes. This research tells us that students with an attendance rate below 90% are educationally at risk.

Consequences of school non-attendance impact academic, socio-economic and health outcomes may include the following:

- * Lower scores and poorer academic outcomes.
- * Increased likelihood of dropping out of school earlier.
- * Poorer long-term mental health and social outcomes.





School Uniform

As the winter season continues to drop in temperature we encourage parents and carers to ensure that their children have adequate warm clothing on. Children may like to wear thermal clothing underneath their school uniform tops and jumpers. We also encourage extra jackets and it has been great to see some students wearing black or red jackets to match our school uniform colours.

Beanies may be worn during winter time but students will be asked to take them off in class time as the same with school hats. Please keep caps at home as we have school hats in place.

Student Reports

Rural Access Gap (RAG) Program

Our school is now part of the NSW Public Education initiative, Rural Access Gap Program. The focus of the RAG Direct Intervention Package is to overcome an inequity of access to digital technologies that support schools. The RAG is the first stage of the Schools Digital Strategy (SDS) that aims to ensure rural schools are digitally transformed to match their metropolitan counterparts. The department has provided each school a staffing allocation for 12 months to deliver the program.

Mrs Denton has started preparing and working with the team from the department to start implementing the program from Term 3.

The Rural Access Gap infrastructure Rollout (RAGiR) is a key component of the RAG program. Its aim is to close the gap in rural and remote areas by delivering the following:

- More than 14,000 teachers will have access to a laptop.
- More than 200,000 students will benefit from a higher availability of devices to reach a minimum device-to-student ratio of 1:4.
- More than 11,000 learning spaces will have access to a Main Learning Display (interactive display).
- 1,002 rural and remote schools will achieve network connectivity of 5 Mbps per student. Here is a direct link for further information for parents and carers who make like to find out more about the program.

Corowa Landcare Wirraminna Excursion









Today with Sally we learnt some interesting facts about frogs. We learnt about burrowing frogs and the Peron's Tree frog. We looked at the Corroboree frog in the learning centre and the fish. It was really fun! With Lou and Maddi we played a game

to learn about squirrel glider threats. We looked at a preserved squirrel glider called 'Matilda' who had sadly died due to a barbed wire fence. With Stacee we had to find the white cut out silhouettes of animals that had their name and a number on it. We found all the animals and got a sticker. It was very interesting and we learnt a lot of new facts about different topics. It was the best Excursion ever!!! Ellie and Ella





We learnt about different types of frogs like the Peron's Tree frog, the Pobble Bonk and the Corrobboree frog. Frogs like





to live where it is moist, near water and under leaf litter. The squirrel glider lives in tree hollows and flies from tree to tree using the expanded skin between their legs. It was great to go to Wirraminna to learn about native animals and nature. I learnt that I am better when I learn outdoors. Liam & Koby



It was awesome and fun going to Wirraminna! We learnt that frogs pop their eyes out so that they can see predators better and they burrow under leaves to hide. Some frogs can jump about 30 metres when they need to. Squirrel gliders can glide to the next tree, 30 – 70 metres away and that people are destroying trees which is making less homes for the squirrel gliders. Rylee & Emily



It was really fun!! We really liked the silhouettes

where we got to run around to find all the hidden native animals. We learnt that different

frogs have different calls and that frogs can be as small as 2 centimetres to 15 centimetres. Burrowing frogs live under leaf litter and that Pobble Bonk frogs can push out their eyes to see better. Squirrel gliders fly between trees and can sometimes get caught in barbed wire fences. That is why we need to use plain wire. Cats and wild dogs are a threat to squirrel gliders and the Barking Owl also eat them. Addi and Ella W



We think this was a great activity. We learnt that squirrel gliders use membrane to fly between trees and that they like to eat the nectar on silver wattles. We learnt what taxidermy means looked pictures at predators that attack squirrel gliders. "Bonk.



bonk, bonk," is the sound of the Pobble Bonk frog. They dig a burrow for

safety to lay their eggs and in dry times also. Moisture is essential for their survival. Wallace, Tilly and Fynn



We got to see what the most dangerous frog looked like, heard the mating call of some frogs, learnt about their habitat and adaptions to survive in the environment like good camouflage. We learnt about the squirrel glider, their habitat and predators like the foxes, cats and owls and that they also get caught in barbed wire fences. To fix this we need to plant more trees, stop using barbed wire fences and keep cats inside at night. With Stacee we learnt how to read a map, apex predators and the names of many native animals. We all feel like it was a really good excursion and we all learnt lots of new information. Blake, Kade and Andre



Frogs can change colour. When frogs are a baby they breathe through gills and when they are adults they get lungs. Squirrel gliders are threatened by their predators. It was fun to explore nature. Finding the animal silhouettes was a bit hard but we absolutely loved it.

Different animals are going extinct or are extinct. Squirrel gliders are about 30cm. They have to avoid barbed wire and their apex predators are cats, dingoes and the Barking Owl. Depending on the type of frog they like shallow water and



each frog has a different call to attract a mate. We loved the excursion and would like to do it again. Adam and James







Today a Wirraminna Sally taught us about some different species of frogs and where they live. Maddi and Lou taught us about squirrel gliders. We learnt they have predators like dogs, dingoes and foxes. We played a game with roles that included being either a tree, barbed wire, fox, barking owl or squirrel glider. If we plant more trees we can help save them. We learnt how to navigate with a map and find what we needed to find. We found all of them. 
